
City Council Members:

Upcoming Street Projects

The City has been planning for a large street and utility project for many years. The streets included in the project are in the northwest part of Freeport near the fire hall and between the trail and I-94 east of County Road 11. Sewer work in some alleys in NE Freeport is also included. Residents immediately impacted by the project were invited to a public hearing where our Engineer gave a detailed project overview back in October. The water main and sanitary sewer in this area are original to the city and parts are in excess of 100 years old! We will be replacing the sanitary sewer, water main, and adding storm sewer to help improve the reliability of our system and to preserve our streets. The project is expected to be bid in the spring with construction starting in late spring or early summer depending on the contractor's schedule. Construction will take about 5 months to complete and will be complete before next winter. The project will be funded by the US Department of Agriculture with a low interest loan.

Winter Parking Rules

To facilitate snow removal, it shall be unlawful for any vehicle, trailer, or other object to park or remain parked on a public street, alley, or way, or in a municipal parking lot from and including November 1, to and including March 31, between the hours of 2:30 a.m. and 6:00 a.m. during or after any snow fall which accumulates over one-tenth (1/10) of an inch until such time as the snow removal crews have cleared the public street, alley, or way, or municipal parking lot.

Building Permits

Subd.9 Building Permits

As required, no person shall erect, alter, or move any building or part thereof without first securing a building permit from the city. If you are uncertain if your project falls under this ordinance please call city hall.

Spring Cleaning

As the snow begins to melt and we are left with many gifts upon our yards we ask that the residents work on cleaning up yards and remove the debris that has accumulated during the winter months.

Looking Ahead

The warming of the upcoming months have us retrieving the fun things we put away for the winter including campers and boats we are reminded of our outdoor storage ordinance:

Any combination of five (5) or fewer licensed and operable recreational vehicles (RV's, boats, snowmobiles on a trailer, etc.) and/or seasonal automobiles may be parked or stored on property outside a home, provided: a. They are not stored within the front yard, except if parked on an approved driveway.

b. If stored within the side or rear yard, they are at least five feet from the property line, placed on an improved surface (e.g. crushed rock, gravel, asphalt, concrete, etc. Areas in which grass or weeds grow through the surface shall not meet said 'improved surface' requirement.

Grease

We are still experiencing a lot of grease in our sanitary sewer line. This is extremely problematic and we need residents to refrain from dumping grease down the drains. Again, doing this could result in your personal lines getting backed and causing backups along the city sewer lines.
